

Allamakee County

EFFIGY MOUNDS NATIONAL MONUMENT

Location: Highway 76, 4 miles north of Marquette

Description: No visit to Allamakee County would be complete without stopping at Iowa's only national monument, the Effigy Mounds. There are 206 known prehistoric American Indian mounds within the borders of the park, 31 of which are shaped in the likeness (effigy) of bears or birds. The 2,526-acre park is divided into two units (North and South) by the Yellow River. Walking trails provide modest to extended routes, allowing you to select your route and view a variety of mounds. Open year-round. An accessible boardwalk trail into the wetlands near the Visitor Center is available for disabled visitors and persons of all walking abilities.

North Unit: The two-mile Fire Point Trail takes visitors past the Little Bear Mound to the Fire Point and Eagle Rock overlooks, rising 300 feet above the Mississippi River. Guided tours along the Fire Point Trail take approximately 1 1/2 hours. Longer self-guided tours include the Twins Views Trail (three-mile round trip), the Third Scenic View Trail (four-mile round trip), and the Hanging Rock Trail (seven-mile round trip).

South Unit: From the parking lot 1/2 mile south of the main gate, visitors can hike on well-defined trails through tallgrass prairie to see the Compound Mound (four-mile round trip) and Marching Bear Group (four-mile round trip) in the South Unit of the park. The trail to the Marching Bear Group also follows part of the historic route of the 1840 Military Road.

WAUKON CITY PARK

Location: Southern edge of Waukon off Highway 9

Description: Forty-six rolling acres of open park make this a great stopping point for travelers looking to take a break from the road. Picnic shelters, hiking trails, and camping facilities make this an attractive resting place, and recently constructed playground structure, Hideaway Park, offers fun for the whole family.

YELLOW RIVER STATE FOREST

Location: Southeast Allamakee County, 729 State Forest Road, forest entrance via Harpers Ferry or State Highway 76

Description: First acquired as a state forest in 1935, the Yellow River State Forest has grown to encompass nearly 8,500 acres of natural beauty. Some of Iowa's most unique forest features and terrain are found in the forest, and a wide variety of plant and animal life (including more than 65 species of birds) make this carefully managed timberland a lovely place to visit. Year-round camping is available, and hikers, equestrians, snowmobilers, and cross-country skiers are sure to appreciate the extensive trail system. Hunting and fishing are also popular activities in the forest.

UPPER MISSISSIPPI RIVER NATIONAL WILDLIFE & FISH REFUGE

Location: There are four district offices and a main headquarters. The headquarters and Winona District office are located in the Exchange Building on 4th Street in Winona, Minnesota. From Highway 61, turn north on Huff Street until it intersects with 4th Street; turn right. The Exchange

Building is on the right-hand side of the road. The McGregor District office is located at 401 Business Hwy 18 N, between the towns of McGregor and Marquette, Iowa.

Description: Soaring overhead, a bald eagle dives to catch a walleye from the Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and Fish Refuge. The 261-mile refuge is the longest in the U.S. excluding Alaska. The refuge begins at the confluence of the Chippewa River near Wabasha, Minnesota, and ends near Rock Island, Illinois. The refuge lies within four states: Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa, and Illinois. This 200,000 acre refuge consists of wooded islands, water and marshes. This refuge is managed for the benefit of migratory birds, fish, plants and other animals. Primitive camping is limited to fourteen days.

Blackhawk County

GEORGE WYTH MEMORIAL STATE PARK

Location: Located on the Cedar River within the Waterloo-Cedar Falls metropolitan area.

Description: George Wyth State Park's large expanse of woodland is abundant with many varieties of wildlife. Bird-watchers have observed more than 200 different species and white-tailed deer can be seen year-round. The park has been designated as a National Urban Wildlife Sanctuary. At George Wyth, the visitor can truly "get away" from the busy metropolitan area and take advantage of a variety of outdoor recreation activities in a very natural setting.

A growing number of campers are enjoying the experience of camping within a metropolitan area. The campground has 58 camping units, modern showers, rest rooms and a trailer dump station. Starting February 13, 2006 advance campsite reservations can be booked through the park reservation system. Half of the campsites are still available for self-registration on a first-come, first-serve basis.

George Wyth has 5.5 miles of paved multi-purpose trails, which are great for biking, in-line skating and walking. These trails are linked to a 70 mile trail network within the cities of Waterloo and Cedar Falls. George Wyth also has 6 miles of grass hiking trails. In winter, sports such as cross-country skiing, and snowmobiling are also popular. The Lake-to-Lake State Park Bike Route is a 50 mile route connecting Pine Lake and George Wyth Memorial State Parks. This route primarily utilizes county highways, and established bike routes and paths once inside Cedar Falls/Waterloo. The Cedar Trails Partnership includes over 80 miles of paved, multi-use recreation trails in the Waterloo-Cedar Falls metropolitan area. The trail system provides links for parks, playing fields, lakes, business, shopping districts, schools and neighborhoods in the metro area. Carry your own gear and "rough it" in the campgrounds or take comfort in a local bed and breakfast or motel along the route. Some bed and breakfasts and park concessionaires offer a shuttle service of gear or luggage for a nominal fee. Reservations for this service must be made in advance. BLACKHAWK PARK

Location: The entrance to the park is located on W. Lone Tree Road, 2 miles west of Hwy 218, in northern Cedar Falls.

Description: Black Hawk Park is named after Chief Black Hawk of the Sauk Indian tribe. He was a very successful leader and displayed a great love of nature. Black Hawk Park was the first park acquired by the Black Hawk County Conservation Board. The first portion of the park, 325 acres, was acquired in 1957. The park is now one of the largest county parks in Iowa. The park's 1,490 acres form a greenbelt along the Cedar River from Cedar Falls to Washington Union Bridge, four miles north.

HICKORY HILLS PARK

Location: A 30 minute drive from downtown Waterloo. It is 1.75 miles south of the Black Hawk-Tama County line on County Road V-37 (Dysart Road).

Description: The park offers many leisure and recreation opportunities including camping, basketball, picnicking, sand volleyball, disc golf, hiking, fishing, cross-country skiing, sledding, and ice skating. Snowmobiles are not allowed. Several miles of hiking trails offer park users a chance to witness nature's endless variety. The 39 acre Casey Lake, nestled between scenic forested slopes, is one of Northeast Iowa's premiere largemouth bass hot spots.

MACFARLANE PARK

Location: McFarlane Park is located two miles east of La Porte City in southern Black Hawk County. To reach the park from La Porte City, take Bishop Road east two miles, then King Road north 1/4 mile.

Description: The park offers many attractions to park users. A 5 acre campground is equipped with a modern shower house and dump station. Campers must self-register within one hour of arrival. Some camp sites may be reserved. Over two miles of walking trails will lead you on a trek through the park where wildlife, trees, woodland flowers and scenic meadows await you. The park is also located adjacent to the popular Cedar Valley Nature Trail. A ramp provides access to the Cedar River and Wolf Creek for small boats. Fishing can be excellent with smallmouth bass, catfish, and walleye frequently caught. The Cedar River is a popular stream for canoers. There are many accesses located both upstream and down from McFarlane Park. The eastern portion, owned by the state, provides a place to hunt. The western developed part, owned by the county, is closed to hunting. Special regulations as posted are in effect.

SIGGELKOV PARK

Location: 4 miles north and 1 mile east of Dunkerton

Description: This heavily wooded park of 54 acres offers camping, canoeing, drinking water, picnicking areas, toilets and stream fishing.

Description: Washington Union Access offers hiking, mountain biking, and canoeing.

Bremer County

CEDAR BEND PARK

Location: Near Waverly, Iowa.

Description: The campground has both 20 and 30 amp electrical outlets at over 60 sites and a dump station. The park has flush toilets, showers, and two wells for drinking water. The park has three picnic and playground areas, three sand volleyball courts, three horseshoe pits and an amphitheater. Over four miles of trails wind through forests, fields, and along the river's edge. In 1991, an Interpretive Trail was developed at the west end of the park. The trail highlights the uplands, floodplains, and wetland areas of Cedar Bend Park and takes 30-45 minutes to complete. Canoeists and fishing enthusiasts can gain access to the Cedar River through Cedar Bend Park. A recycling shed is also available for campers. The park is open for hunting and trapping from November 1 - January 10.

NORTH CEDAR PARK

Location: Near Plainfield, Iowa.

Description: The campground has both 20 and 30 amp electrical outlets at over 40 sites and a dump station. The park has a well for drinking water, flush toilets, and showers. A recycling shed is also available for campers and visitors using the park. The park has one shelter, a playground area, sand volleyball court and horseshoe pits. Over two miles of trails wind through forests, fields, and along the river's edge. A boat ramp in the park allows canoeists and fishing enthusiasts' access to the Cedar River. The park is open for hunting November 1- January 10. In 1997 and 1998, a hiking trail was constructed from the city of Plainfield to North Cedar Park by Plainfield community members and BCCB staff. This trail was later enhanced in 1998 when Jamie Borglum constructed an interpretive trail along a portion of it for his Eagle Scout Project.

ALCOCK PARK

Location: In Frederika, Iowa.

Description: The campground has both 20 and 30 amp electrical outlets at over fifty sites. The park has 2 wells for drinking water, showers and flush toilets, pit toilets and a camper dump station. Canoeists and fishing enthusiasts can gain access to the Wapsipinicon River through the park's shoreline or Alcock Park's boat ramp. The park is closed to hunting and trapping. The park also offers a sand volleyball court, horseshoe pits, two shelters, and two picnic/playground areas.

NORTHWOODS PARK

Location: Near Sumner, Iowa.

Description: The campground at North Woods has both 20 and 30 amp electrical outlets. The park has a well for drinking water, two shelters, pit toilets, and recycling bins. The park has a picnic area with playground equipment, sand volleyball court, horseshoe pits and over one mile of trails that wind through forests and fields adjacent to the Wilson Grove Wildlife Area.

Buchanan County

FONTANA PARK

Location: N/A

Description: Fontana Park is the county's most popular camping destination. The campground has its own shower house with flush toilets, and a dump station. There is a lot to do while camping at Fontana Park. Fishing is popular both above the dam and in the creek that winds along the campground below the dam. The nature center is open on weekend afternoons, and campers can walk to the live animal display, which is open throughout the day. Also in walking distance from the campground are nature trails, shelter houses, and a playground. During most weekends, campground hosts are stationed in the campground. These friendly volunteers assist campers by answering questions, selling firewood, reporting misconduct, and helping to keep the grounds clean and safe. The campground at Fontana Park fills quickly, especially once school is out in late May. To get your favorite site, arrive early on Friday, or earlier in the week. After 10:30 p.m. on weekends, a chain is stretched across the campground entrance, but not locked, to discourage non-campers from entering the grounds during quiet hours.

JAKWAY PARK

Location: South of Aurora, Iowa.

Description: The campground is nestled in the vast Jakway Forest, and campers can walk the self-guided and forest trails. Buffalo Creek winds through the forest. Campers can try fishing for small fish in the creek, or in the old quarry pond. Also at Jakway, campers can walk to the playground, use the shelter house, and view the historic Richardson-Jakway House and grounds. A wildlife observation blind is located in the woodland.

Location: North of Brandon, Iowa.

Description: Not far from the Cedar Valley Trail, campers at Lime Creek may want to bring their bicycles. As its name implies, Lime Creek meanders through the park. A playground and shelter house is available right in the campground. The Conservation Board recently improved the electrical service at Lime Creek, allowing for more power use by campers.

AIRPORT LAKE PARK

Location: 2 miles northwest of New Hampton.

Description: 57 acres with a semi-modern campground with 18 electric sites 20 non-electric; beach; 2 shelters; fishing; hiking; pit toilets; upland areas with restored prairie.

Location: 5 miles southwest of Fredericksburg.

Description: 80 acres of land with a modern campground containing 42 electric sites and 30 non-electric. The lands offer an upland area with restored prairie, woodlands, and wetlands.

UNITED METHODIST CAMP

Location: 12004 19th St., Monticello, Iowa

Description: Pictured Rocks United Methodist Camp was established in 1960 as a summer camp and year-round retreat center. Adjacent to the camp is a state wildlife refuge, Pictured Rocks, which provides access to limestone bluffs and the scenic South Fork of the Maquoketa River. Owned and operated by the Iowa Conference of the United Methodist Church, its purpose is to provide "opportunities for persons to grow in their relationship to God, especially in His redeeming love as revealed in Jesus Christ." We welcome usage by local churches and other organizations with purposes consistent with our Christian principles.

The camp is available for Youth, Adults, and Families, local church retreats, district retreats, vacation bible schools, family reunions, school systems, hiking, and nature study. Lodges, kitchens, picnic shelters, overhead projectors, TVs, VCRs, ping pong table, projection screen, sound system, and other items are available with advanced reservations.
